A LAYMAN'S VIEW OF NUTS AND BOLTS

I have been using the diagnostic program called nuts and bolts for about a year now with what I consider good results. As anyone who has ever gone through a crash and burn can attest to it can be very frustrating to say the least.

For those who have not (wait your time is coming) a good diagnostic program with some type of crash guard is a definite plus even if it takes up room on the harddrive. I have chosen to go with nuts and bolts because of the ease of using the program.

Some of the useful items that I have found are: 1) Bomb Shelter to help safeguard against crashes, 2) Disk Tune for harddrive maintenance not only will it defrag faster than Windows 95 but also has features to help you organize your files so that frequently used files can be placed near the top of your harddrive for faster access without as much fragmenting. You also can take frequent pictures of your harddrive which is constantly changing as you add and delete files and programs. 3) If you are anything like me you end up with a lot o duplicate programs, orphan files or other junk on your rapidly filling up hard drive. One of the best things I have found to combat this is called Cleanup Wizard this program will let you compare files ,tell you if they are different or identical so you can delete if need be. 4) Zip Man is a good condense program to zip and unzip files to save room on the hard-drive. 5) Cheyenne Anti Virus is a great program to recognize and remove most viruses. 6) How do I keep track of all these things and more you ask? (Well even if you don't ask I will tell you anyway.) Programs called Win Gauge Pro and Launch Pad that can be put right on your computer desk top help you keep in constant contact with the status of your computer. If you do not want these gauges on the desk top they can be hidden from view or you can put only the ones you want to see all can be viewed with only one click. Some of the other programs included with Nuts and Bolts are duplicates of programs that come with windows 95 but check them out you may ind that they perform better then the ones on 95. The only problem I had with this program was with a program called Trashguard. This program is like Recycle Bin but with an added feature it will automatically save any file you are working on at closure even if you don't want it to. It is an extra safeguard that can easily be



disengaged if you don't want it. I have tried a few of the diagnostic safeguard programs such as First Aid 97, Cleansweep and Windows Uninstaller and have found Nuts and Bolts to be a more complete and more user friendly program with more features for the money (about \$50.00) then any other. Also as any good diagnostic program it works in the background and has internet and 1-800 support. As the title implies I am a layman not a computer expert and I am still discovering things (so far good) about this program to aid me in a more efficient and enjoyable use of my computer.

I hope this article has helped anyone who is having problems or looking for a good diagnostic program to make computing easier . If you are an expert on the use of Nuts and Bolts I would appreciate any tips you may have and so might other readers and club members. What I have said in this article is my opinion of this program.

Days may be numbered for tax-free mail order

NEW YORK - Mail-order customers who have dodged state sales taxes on purchases from out-of-the-state companies may have to pay by next Christmas as industries and states close the loophole.

An agreement being negotiated by the trade group for the mail-order industry and officials representing several states calls for merchants to begin collecting what is estimated to be \$1.2 billion annually in sales taxes.

The agreement expected to be announced soon, could be in place in several states in time for Christmas 1998, the New York Times reported. The key is believed to be the participation of the five most populous states -

California, Florida, New York, Texas and Pennsylvania.

Purchases from companies that sell through the mail, by telephone, cable television or over the Internet are subject to the same tax as a customer's transactions at the local department store. But states have had no way to compel out-of-state merchants to collect the taxes on their behalf.

As a result, catalog retailers and other direct marketers have generally ignored the task. State and local governments have complained that they are losing tax revenue on \$215 billion in annual mail-order sales.

The companies have battled constant litigation to maintain the exemption from collecting sales taxes, which the Supreme Court has preserved for business that do not have physical presence in a state.

For that reason, mail-order companies including L.L.Bean and Lands End have pushed for sales tax agreement.

MICROSOFT

Business as usual

Sept 15, 1997 (Seattle) -- Microsoft announced today that it will provide office furniture with its software. The next release of Windows, code named Naugahyde, will include the Microsoft Chair at no extra charge. "This is a natural for us," a Microsoft spokesperson said. "We've conquered the desktop, so we're looking at way of expanding our installed base."

The spokesperson denied accusations that bundling constitutes an unfair competitive advantage. "We're just listening to our customers. They've asked for more built in features, and who doesn't use a chair when they're at their computer? Especially when they're waiting for Windows to reboot."

Beta testers noted its large footprint and found the chair to lack substantial features found in most of the competition. But when asked if they dislike it enough to purchase another vendor's furniture, most stated that they would just take what Microsoft had to offer.

Also in the works is a small seat, dubbed the Microsoft Stool, soon to be bundled with laptops. Beta testers were surprised to find the backless chair at their doorsteps. "Then again, it's not the first time we've received a shrink-wrapped stool sample from Microsoft," noted one breathless customer.



Online Newsletter with Acrobat Reader

Easy and free viewing or printing program of Adobe's Acrobat PDF files

Adobe's Acrobat Reader allows you to read the common PDF (Portable Document Format) files that are created by Adobe's Acrobat software. In addition to the standard features found in the standalone Acrobat Reader client, Acrobat Reader offers PDF viewing from within Netscape browser (plug-in technology at work once again) or within the Internet Explorer browser (ActiveX Control technology.) This freeware reader won't let you create your own PDF files; however, it will give you the ability to read any PDF file you come across — don't be surprised when you find more than a few of these files scattered across the web and even on your hard drive (the new Acrobat Search and AutoIndex plug-in are great aids in helping to ferret out any Acrobat files that happen to be residing on your hard drive).

Creative Labs= DVD drive really delivers

DVD, Digital Video Disc. Digital Versatile Disc. The Super CD. CD of Tomorrow. Whatever you want to call it DVD is here.

Shortly after DVD was introduced as a video medium the first DVD-ROM drives appeared on the market. These drives were both slow and expensive making them unattractive for home use.

Just this past month however Creative Labs (creators of the Sound Blaster) released the PC-DVD Encore drive.



The Encore is a second generation DVD drive that promises an all-in-one solution.

Installation of the DVD-Encore is quite simple. There are two basic components, a P.I. decoder card and the DVD-ROM drive.

The DVD looks

just like a standard CD-ROM drive. Once installed in your PC a quick run of the driver disk will have everything up and running in no time.

Performance-wise, the Encore DVD drive is quite speedy. It is both a 2X DVD drive and a 20X CD-ROM drive.

At 20X speed-reading CDs, the Encore DVD is fast enough to serve as a replacement for that old 4X currently sitting in your computer. Wait you say, what if I already have a great CD-ROM drive and don't want to pitch it? Don't worry. The Encore DVD drive is designed to either replace or work alongside your current CD-ROM drive. The choice is yours.

More than meets the eye

One of the main advantages of the Encore DVD-ROM is the fact that it is more than just a DVD-ROM drive. In addition to reading audio CDs and CD-ROMs, the DVD Encore also supports Video CD and DVD Video. The unit has composite and SVHS output as well as a AC-3 Dolby Digital audio connection for those of you with AC-3 sound systems.

Movie quality on the computer screen is good, but it looks even better when hooked to a television.

As far as software is concerned the Encore DVD is a bit on the light side. The kit comes with the hardware drives and only two software titles, Claw and Wing Commander IV. Those accustomed to Creative's typical multimedia, which come bundled with loads of software, may be a bit disappointed by the lack of titles. However, what is there is done well.

At a retail price of \$380 the Encore DVD is actually cheaper than purchasing a dedicated DVD Video player. If your computer is anywhere near your TV you should consider the Encore DVD over a dedicated player.

If you're considering a DVD-ROM drive, The Encore DVD is the way to go.
