
MICROPHONE TIPS

Does your computer listen? More and more computers now ship with built-in microphones or headset microphones as well as voice recognition, voice memo, and video teleconferencing software.

First, carefully read over the documentation that ships with your voice-related software. You'll want to pay close attention to sound board compatibility listings and settings. Voice packages often work best with certain sound cards and sometimes have known problems with other cards. Check to make sure your card works well with your voice package and is set correctly to get the best performance.

Microphone positioning is crucial to voice recognition and high-quality voice recording. An excellent microphone can make a horrible recording if worn incorrectly. Avoid breath sounds by placing your mike off to the side of your mouth, not directly in front. Never talk with the microphone directly against your lips; there should always be a small gap between your mouth and the mike.

For other positioning tips, read the documentation of the software package that came with your mike. Often you'll find a diagram showing the proper mike positioning for best performance.

How noisy is your work environment? If you encounter more than minimal chatter and machine noise, it may affect the quality of your voice recording or recognition. Read your soft-

ware's documentation on what to do (adjust audio settings, calibrate your microphone) to compensate for unusually high background noise.

Also, once you've made software adjustments, take note whenever there is a change in your environment. If your voice software is set to handle a high level of background noise, it might not function well in periods without any background noise. Above all, try to situate your computer in an area where the level of background noise is constant.

Don't assume that knowing how to talk means you know how to talk to a computer. Voice recognition experts say there is an art or craft to dictating to a computer. Enunciation, volume, and pace are all-important factors in attaining high levels of voice recognition. Your software's documentation should have some information about cultivating the skill of dictating. Practice the techniques until you've mastered them.

If you have a little extra money to spend on your voice setup, check into a wireless microphone. Very few voice-based software packages ship with a wireless mike in the box because of the added expense. However, for \$200 to \$400 you can purchase a high-quality microphone. A wireless device frees you up from your computer so you can walk around the room, even while talking. Most people find they get more use out of a wireless mike than a standard microphone headset.

Take a look, you may be in there!

Color scanners are cheaper than ever. Now you can pick one up for as little as \$100. Over the next few days, I'll pass along some tips that should help you choose among these inexpensive peripherals.

First, don't consider the ENHANCED resolution specification. Instead, look at the OPTICAL resolution spec, which should be 600 dpi (dots per inch) or higher for a quality scanner. Enhanced resolution is simply a software-based image process for adding detail to a scanned image. Unfortunately, most of the time these enhancement algorithms don't work very well. Besides, most image-processing applications perform this function for you, so you don't need your scanner to do any enhancing.

Universal Serial Bus seems to be the hot new interface for scanners, and for flexibility and ease of installation, you can't beat USB. However, if scanning speed is important to you (that is, you work in an art department), you might consider going with a faster interface like SCSI. In terms of data transfer, SCSI outpaces USB. With large, high-resolution scans, you'll notice the speed difference.

Believe it or not, the internal scanning element used to digitize your images can make a big difference in the quality of your scans. Currently, two distinct types of elements are used in scanners--CCD (Charge Coupled Device) and CIS (Contact Image Sensor). In general, CCD elements make for clearer and sharper scanned images, even if the material you are scanning is uneven or textured. However, CCD elements are usually larger than CIS elements and also slightly more expensive than CIS elements. If you are choosing between CCD and CIS for a pair of scanners, however, CCD is generally worth the few extra dollars.

Scanner usability has improved dramatically. Many now offer one-button scan features that let you digitize images quickly and easily. Even so, you should still thoroughly investigate the scanning software that comes with your scanner. You will almost certainly

WINZIP 7.0

If you're reading this only because you need to unzip a file, and you'd rather not even know what a ZIP file *is*, you'll love WinZip. This zipper offers the same quick performance as PKZip and Netzip for the same cost (\$29.95), but it's a lot easier to use--good news for folks who don't have much experience downloading from the Net. But if you want an advanced ZIP utility that will also manage your Net connection, try our favorite, Netzip.

Simple Interface

WinZip offers you three different interfaces, so you can choose which one works best for you. Its Classic mode looks like a traditional Windows working environment, complete with pull-down menus and a toolbar with spots for you to customize up to 21 icons. All you do to extract or retract a file is drag and drop it into WinZip's workspace.

The WinZip Wizard, on the other hand, extracts files automatically--you don't even have to start the application. It pops up as soon as you double-click a zipped file, then guides you through a series of onscreen dialog boxes as you select the files and their destination folders. Once you've made your choices, it extracts the files. You don't even need to know how to operate WinZip to use the Wizard.

The third alternative is less an interface and more like a set of options you get when you right-click a zipped file. Right-click, and WinZip offers either to immediately expand the file and save it to the folder it's already in, or to let you choose where you want the unzipped file to go. And while it's at it, WinZip unzips more than just ZIP files--it also supports UU, TAR, LZH, ARJ (including long filenames), and ARC formats. Plus, WinZip doesn't sacrifice file quality for ease; when we expanded files in WinZip, they emerged intact and unblemished, just as they did from Netzip and PKZip.

On-the-Fly Editing

WinZip 7.0 adds an interesting feature Netzip also offers: the ability to view, change, and save zipped files without having to extract them from their

archive. Just drag a file into the main WinZip window, select Open, and WinZip briefly unzips the file and loads a temporary version of it into the program you used to create the file. (If the application that originally created the file isn't installed on your computer, WinZip will ask for an alternative.) Once you make the changes, save the file from within the app you're using, and WinZip will ask if you want to save your changes to the zipped version. Answer yes, and it updates the zipped version. The whole process takes a bit more work than it does in Netzip, but it still saves you having to rip up an archive to perform just one fix.

Unfortunately, you won't find any of Netzip's downloading tools in WinZip, but WinZip nearly makes up for the difference because it's so easy to use. Even if you don't know what a ZIP file is, you'll probably be able to use WinZip as soon as you install it--perfect for Net surfers who don't have a ton of compression utility experience.

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need to adjust resolution, contrast, and brightness settings at some point, so make sure the software is easy to manipulate.

If you will be digitizing documents for use in your word-processing application, definitely investigate the optical character recognition software that comes with your scanner. Unfortunately, in low-end scanners (costing around \$100), the OCR software is usually a light version of a more full-featured package you would need to purchase separately. Still, you should shop around for the best OCR package that's bundled with a scanner on your list. Unless you frequently digitize documents, you may not need to purchase a separate OCR package.

MONITOR SHOPPING TIPS

Would you like to use your computer monitor for multimedia presentations, in addition to using it for your regular desktop work? Shop for a monitor that accepts video inputs from VCRs, camcorders, and other audiovisual devices. One example of a monitor with this capability is Samsung's SyncMaster 570p Plus TFT. The 570p is a 15-inch LCD flat panel display that features both composite and S-Video input. Check it out at

Is flat a good thing? When you head to the store, you'll find both LCD flat-panel displays and flat-screen CRT monitors. You may wonder if flat screens make a difference in terms of image quality, compared to the traditional curved screen of older CRT monitors.

In a word, yes. For decades, CRT tubes were curved out of necessity, not because of a design choice. The electron gun technology used for many years required a curved tube front, in order to position the internal gun equidistant from every point on the screen. Unfortunately, this curvature slightly distorts the image for the viewer. We've all just gotten used to it over time.

However, a flat screen does present the image without distortion. Thus, if you work in graphic, video, or art production, you may want to spend the extra money on a new flat CRT monitor or a LCD flat-panel display.

Some monitors offer an extra USB hub integrated into the monitor case, and you may ask why. Good question--this feature costs extra money, but really has nothing to do with your monitor. Monitor makers started including USB hubs as a space saver for cramped computing environments (so that the hub unit doesn't take up space in its own separate box).

However, if you don't use USB devices or you don't require any additional USB ports or hubs, you should forgo a USB-ready monitor and save the extra money.

Another strange feature of modern monitors is the integrated speaker set. Like the USB hubs (mentioned in the last tip), integrated speakers are only a space-saving convenience. However, you may find that the speakers aren't any good and you're stuck with them; only a few monitors

allow you to detach and remove the speakers from the monitor case. In addition, if you ever decide to upgrade to surround-sound speakers or to a set that includes a subwoofer, you may find the integrated speakers take up valuable space on your desk. Only consider integrated speakers if you're very space conscious. Most users should purchase speakers separately.

IT ISN'T NECESSARY TO SCAN A HARD DISK OVER AND OVER

Virus Alert

By default, scanners ordinarily check the files that viruses most commonly infect. Thus they scan some files, according to their extensions, and skip others. Other scanners allow the user to make changes to the default to scan some file extensions but not others, or even all files, regardless of extension.

I'd recommend using a current, up-to-date scanner to scan all files on the hard disk, once only. Then you should make a complete backup of all files on the hard disk. After that, you don't need to scan the hard disk's files again (assuming there were no viruses on the hard disk unknown to the scanner at that time). To keep the system clean, scan all incoming files, regardless of their extension and their source, before first use.

Windows 95 Tips

COPY AND PASTE FROM CALCULATOR

Have you ever manually copied a large number from Calculator to another location, only to realize later that the two numbers don't match? You should have let Windows do the copying for you. Assuming you've just used the Calculator (select Start, Programs, Accessories, Calculator) to come up with a figure, press Ctrl-C to copy that number to the clipboard. Switch to the destination, press Ctrl-V, and without fail, you'll see the same number you started out with.

DISPLAY FULL MS-DOS PATH IN TITLE BAR

Want to know the full path of any open folder window at a glance? Ask Windows 95 to display this information right on the title bar.

From inside any Explorer window, select View, Options. Click the View tab, select Display The Full MS-DOS Path In The Title Bar, and click OK. Now, not only does an open window's path appear on the title bar, but it also shows up on the corresponding Taskbar item (whether the window is minimized or not).

(Note: If you have IE 4.0 installed, the full path of any open folder window appears in the Address bar--assuming you have it showing.)

OPTIONS FOR MOVING, COPYING, OR CREATING A SHORTCUT

The next time you need to move or copy an icon, or create a shortcut, keep in mind that you have options. You can right-click and drag an icon (or selection of icons) to the desired destination, release the mouse button, and select Move Here, Copy Here, or Create Shortcut(s) Here (or Cancel, to forget the whole thing).

Alternatively, you can rely on the Shift and Ctrl keys. Hold down Shift as you drag and drop an icon to

move that item; or hold down Ctrl to copy that icon.

But wait, there's yet another option for accomplishing these tasks--the context menu. Select the item(s) you want to move or copy, right-click the selection, and choose Cut (to move) or Copy. Switch to the destination, then right-click a blank area, and select Paste. To create a shortcut, right-click an item and select Create Shortcut to create a shortcut in the same location. You can then move the shortcut to your location of choice.

LOCATE ALL HIDDEN FILES AND FOLDERS

Ever wished you could search out hidden files and directories within a particular folder? If you have Internet Explorer 4.x installed (or you've upgraded to Windows 98), you can sort the contents of any folder by attributes.

First, opt to display file attributes (in Details View). In any Explorer window, select View, Folder Options. On the View tab, select Show File Attributes In Details View and Show All Files, then click OK.

Now open any Explorer window and navigate your way to the folder in which you'd like to search for hidden files and folders. Select View, Details, then click the heading of the Attributes column. Click the same heading again, and the contents of that folder will appear sorted by attributes (in reverse order), with files first, then folders. An H in the Attributes column--alone or mixed with other letters--means that file or folder is hidden.

PAUSE SCREEN DURING BOOT

If you remove the Windows 95 startup logo (that cloudy screen that appears whenever you start Windows), you'll see a whole bunch of text narrating the boot process every time you start your system. Want to actually read this text? Unless you can read really, really fast, you'll need this trick: You can bring the boot process (and all the text on screen) to a screeching halt by pressing the Pause key on your keyboard.

WINDOWS 98 TIPS

SIZE COLUMNS TO FIT WIDEST ENTRY

When you view a folder's contents in Details view (select View, Details), some columns of information are probably cut off. (Each cut-off entry is followed by ellipses.) One way to view the hidden information is to resize each column. Or, try this trick: Hold down the Ctrl key as you press the plus sign (+) on your numeric keypad. Instantly, Windows sizes every column to fit the widest entry. (Note: In many cases, you'll need to enlarge the window to see every column of information.)

(Tip-in-a-tip: Pressing Ctrl++ also shrinks oversized columns to fit the widest entry.)

ACCESS MY DOCUMENTS FROM START MENU

Did you just select Start, Documents only to discover that the file you wanted has been bumped from the list? Don't worry, you can access all of your files from the Documents list (assuming you store your documents in My Documents). Inside the Documents list, select the top dog, My Documents. There you have it--instant access to all your data files.

CHANGE BACKGROUND OF FOLDER WINDOW

CHANGE ICON LABELS IN FOLDER

Icon labels don't quite match your selection? Then change them. Follow the steps above to select a background image. Before clicking Next, under Icon Caption Colors, click the box next to Text and select a color. For example, you might select white or yellow to contrast with a dark background. Click OK, and if desired, click the check box next to Background and choose a color for the box that surrounds each icon label. Click Next, click Finish, and you won't even recognize that folder!

REMOVE FOLDER CUSTOMIZATION

To remove all customization options from a folder, open the folder window, select View, Customize This Folder, and select Remove Customization. Click Next twice, click Finish, and that window is back to plain ol' black on white (or whatever colors are defined by your current color scheme).

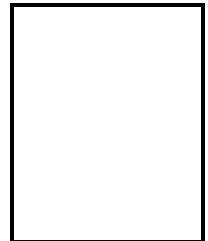
