Automatically Selecting Words

When you are editing your document, there are many times that Word tries to guess what you are doing and then complete your task for you. This helpfulness can be aggravating at times. One such instance is when you are trying to use the mouse to select text from the middle of one word to the middle of another. Whenever you click inside a word and then start dragging the mouse, Word assumes you want to make a selection. As soon as you move the mouse pointer outside the word, the program assumes you wanted to select the entire first word in which you originally clicked.

If you want to ensure that Word doesn't make that assumption, you need to follow these steps to turn off the offending feature in Word 97 through Word 2003:

- 1. Choose Options from the Tools menu. Word displays the Options dialog box.
- 2. Make sure the Edit tab is selected.

- 3. Make sure the When Selecting, Automatically Select Entire Word check box is cleared.
- 4. Click on OK.

You can follow these steps if you are using Word 2007 or Word 2010:

- 1. Display the Word Options dialog box. (In Word 2007 click the Office button, then choose Word Options. In Word 2010 display the File tab of the ribbon, then click Options.)
- 2. Click Advanced at the left side of the screen.

- 3. In the Editing Options area, make sure the When Selecting, Automatically Select Entire Word check box is cleared.
- 4. Click on OK.

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Atari had talked for years about having a portable <u>Atari</u> <u>ST computer system</u>, but it did not arrive until very late in 1989 - on Dec 9, 1989 the Stacy finally received FCC approval.

Originally designed to operate on 12 standard C cell flashlight batteries, this proved insuffient to operate the Stacy for an extended period of time. With 4Megs of RAM and a hard drive, 15 minutes of use was about all the life the batteries could give you. Additionally, the 15 pound / 7 kg Stacy with external power-pack is somewhat inconvenient to lug around.



How to get rid of the "This device can perform faster" message

When you plug an older USB device into your Windows 7 computer, you might get a pop-up message that says "This USB device can perform faster if you connect it to a Hi-Speed USB 2.0 port. For a list of available ports, click here." You probably just ignore the message or close it with the X, but you can prevent it from bugging you every time. Here's how:

1. In the pop-up, click to view the list of available USB 2.0 ports.

2. At the bottom of the dialog box listing the ports, you'll see a checkbox (checked by default) that says "Tell me if my device can perform faster." Uncheck the box.

Click Close.

Take monthly photo walks

Backup, backup, backup

Never work on an original file. Always keep an untouched original file somewhere and back up everything. And did I mention—**BACKUP!**

Formatting

The best way to avoid having card problems (being able to write to a card or read from it) is to get in the habit of formatting the card regularly. This is best done in the camera, and all digital cameras offer the ability to do this. What happens is that a new directory structure is written to the card, rather than simple writing more to the existing one. Just be sure that you've already downloaded any images from the card that you want to keep.

Recovery Software

Threre may be time when you're unable to get the image off your card. Some of the reasons that can happen are because the directory of the card has gotten corupted., you've shot a card full, formatted the card accidently or due to a dying battery. In those cases you've probably need card recovery software. There are a number of programs out there that will recover the images 90% of the time. SanDisk sells <u>RescuePRO</u> and it also comes bundled with their Extreme II and Extreme IV cards (as a coupon for download or the software itself. <u>Lexar Image Rescue</u> and <u>Photo Rescue</u> are two other popular programs.

WORDTIPS



Excel includes a feature that allows you to automatically fill a range of cells with information you have placed in just a few cells. For instance, you could enter the value 1 in a cell, and then 2 in the cell just beneath it. If you then select the two cells and drag the small black handle at the bottom right corner of the selection, you can fill any number of cells with incrementing numbers. This AutoFill feature sure beats having to type in all the values!

You may wonder if there is a similar way to use the AutoFill feature to place random numbers in a range. Unfortunately, the AutoFill feature was never meant for random numbers. Why? Because AutoFill uses predictive calculations to determine what to enter into a range of cells. For example, if you entered 1 into one cell and 5 into the next, highlighted the cells and then used AutoFill, the next number entered in the cell below would be 9 because Excel can deduce that the increment is 4. It is a constant increment that can be predicted.

Random numbers on the other hand are, well, random. By nature they cannot be predicted, else they wouldn't be

random. Therefore the predictive nature of AutoFill cannot be applied to random numbers.

However, there are ways around this. One is to simply use the various formulas (using RAND and RANDBE-TWEEN) to generate random numbers. These formulas can quickly and easily be copied over a range of cells, using a variety of copying techniques.

Another approach is to use a feature of the Analysis ToolPak which makes putting random numbers into a range of cells pretty easy. Just follow these steps:

1. Choose Data Analysis from the Tools menu. If you are using Word 2007 or Word 2010, you display the Data tab of the ribbon and then click Data Analysis in the Analysis group. (If you don't see the Data Analysis option on the Tools menu or, in Word 2007 or Word 2010, you don't see the Analysis group on the Data tab of the ribbon, it means that you don't have the Analysis ToolPak enabled.) Excel displays the Data Analysis dialog box.

- 2. In the list of functions in the dialog box, choose Random Number Generation.
- 3. Click on OK. Excel displays the Random Number Generation dialog box.

- 4. Using the controls in the dialog box, indicate the parameters you want used in generating a range of random numbers. (Make sure that you specify a range of cells in the Output Options area of the dialog box.)
- 5. Click on OK.
