- ⇒ Begin your message right at the top of the reply.
- ⇒ Include the original message you received below.
- ⇒ Make sure your signature is above the original message.
- ⇒ When "forwarding" emails, delete the sender's personal information and any included email addresses from previous "forwards."
- ⇒ When "forwarding" to more than one recipient, place their email addresses in the BCC line of the email. This protects their privacy and prevents unscrupulous computer users from sending spam and viruses to lists of email addresses that they have acquired from "forwarded" messages.




Displaying a Hidden First Column

Excel makes it easy to hide and unhide columns. What isn't so easy is displaying a hidden column if that column is the left-most column in the worksheet. For instance, if you hide column A, Excel will dutifully follow out your instructions. If you later want to unhide column A, the solution isn't so obvious.

To unhide the left-most columns of a worksheet when they are hidden, follow these steps:

1. Press **F5**. Excel displays the Go To dialog box.

- 2. In the Reference field at the bottom of the dialog box, enter A1.
- 3. Click on OK. Cell A1 is now selected, even though you cannot see it on the screen.
- 4. Unhide the column. (In Excel 2007 or Excel 2010, display the Home tab of the ribbon and click Format | Hide & Unhide | Unhide Columns. In older versions of Excel choose Format | Column | Unhide.)

Another way to display the first column is to click on the header for column B, and then drag the mouse to the left. If you release the mouse button when the pointer is over the gray block that marks the intersection of the row and column headers (the blank gray block just above the row headers), then column B and everything to its left, including the hidden column A, are selected. You can then unhide the column.

A third method is even niftier, provided you have a good eye and a steady mouse pointer. If you move your mouse pointer into the column header area, and then slowly move it to the left, you notice that it turns into a double-headed arrow with a blank spot in the middle as you position the pointer over the small area immediately to the left of the column B header. This double-headed arrow is a bit difficult to describe; it looks most closely like the double-headed arrow that appears when you position the pointer over the dividing line between column headers. It is different, however, because instead of a black line dividing the double arrows, there are two black lines with a gap between them.




THE KEY IS IN THE LOCK: When making online purchases, one of the keys to making certain your transaction is secure will be the icon of the lock, somewhere in the window of the browser. You should even be able to click on it to see details of a site's security.



Printing Odd or Even Pages

There may be many times that you need to print either odd or even pages in a print job. For instance, you may want to put your pages through the printer twice so you can print on both sides. This is easy to do in Word by following these steps:

1. Press **CTRL+P**. Word displays the Print dialog box.

- 2. Adjust the printing settings as desired.
- 3. Using the Print drop-down list at the bottom of the dialog box, choose either Odd Pages

- or Even Pages, as desired. (Make sure you use the Print drop-down list, not the Print What drop-down list.)
- 4. Click on OK. Your document is printed.


The above steps work great in any version of Word up through Word 2007. If you are using Word 2010, then the Print dialog box was done away with. You should follow these steps, instead:

- 1. Press **CTRL+P**. Word displays the File tab of the ribbon, with printing options visible in the tab.
- 2. Adjust the printing settings as desired.
- 3. Using the first drop-down list under the Settings heading, choose Only Print Odd Pages or Only Print Even Pages, as desired.
- 4. Click on Print. Your document is printed.

I found out it is very important to keep Windows up to date.

I had some real serious virus problems on my main computer which I have completely cured. I had found help with someone at Microsoft. I think the virus turned off my automatic update setting which made things worse.

Below are simple instructions to check for Updates for windows. It might take a few minutes for the connection to search your computer for updates and you may already have your computer set for automatic updates (recommended) but even if you do, this is the way to make sure you have anything that needs to be updated.

It will also allow you to download and install any updates needed. (This is all free from Microsoft)

The computer I did this on is running Windows XP. I also have one with Vista and another with Windows 7. If you are running Vista or Windows 7 there may be different instructions.

Here are the instructions. If you get an error coming back at you, there are instructions on how to copy the page (make a screen shot) so you can send it to Microsoft for further help:

Keep the computer up-to-date

1. Please open Internet Explorer from the Start menu.

- 2. Click Tools, and click Windows Update.
- 3. Click Express to run a scan, and then follow the instructions to install the available updates.

Please be sure that if the site doesn't list any updates to install, it means the current system is secure with all necessary updates installed and no troubleshooting is needed. Thanks for your understanding.

However, if any error is encountered, please feel free to let me know and help capture a screenshot for further research.

How to capture a Screenshot:

1. When the error appears, please press the Print Screen key (PrtScn) on your keyboard.

Simple to do!

- 2. Click Start, click Run, type MSPAINT, and click OK.
- 3. In Paint, click Paste under the Edit Menu, click Save under the File menu, type a file name for the screenshot, choose JPEG as "Save as type", click "Desktop" on the left pane, and click Save.
- 4. Please find the screenshot on the Desktop and send it as an attachment to:






