Len, James, and Mike discussed the latest in technology AND offered a free PC tune up to anyone who brought their computer to the meeting. Staples staff arrived early and by noon were working on members' computers. Everyone liked the idea of techs working on their machines and getting them back right away. James and Mike finished working on the last computers just before 4 p.m. Donna Kalinoski was a very happy camper when they made her "sick" PC well again.

Staples PC Tune up removes adware and spyware, makes sure all security software is up to date, fixes missing items in the registry, optimizes your hard drive, gets rid of temp files and defrags your hard drive. They also offer PC Boost in the store which removes unneeded programs from the start up menu, makes the computer more efficient, and removes system services and extra toolbars that are not needed (There is a fee for this service.).

Len, James, and Mike spoke about many areas of technology including cloud computing, RAID configurations, and anti-virus protection.

Len strongly recommended purchasing external hard drives. He said that when buying a hard drive, buy the largest you can afford. You will eventually use the space, and it is cheaper per gigabyte to buy a larger drive than a small one. Because USB 3.0 drives are being introduced, Len said to watch for clearance prices on USB 2.0 drives. The advantage of USB 3.0 is that the data transfer rate is much faster than USB 2.0. In theory, it will transfer 5GB per second. USB 3.0 will work on USB 2.0 equipment (at USB 2.0 speeds) but you will need equipment that is USB 3.0 compatible to take advantage of the higher transfer speed.

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-dated programs and plug-ins which expose your PC to attacks. It sounds like an interesting program.

I heard that *Maximum PC* recently proclaimed that the three best security programs were Microsoft Security Essentials, Malwarebytes Anti-Malware, and SuperAntiSpyware. All three programs are free. Cleaner is a free program that can be used to wipe your old drive free of data if you are giving it away.

Storage prices are definitely dropping. I recently saw a 3TB USB 2.0/3.0 external drive for about the same price as the same company's USB 2.0 drive last fall.


Add Text on a Photo in Word 2007

When creating a document it may be useful to place text with or on top of a photo. You could create a new photo with the text in a digital photo editing application and then save it for use. But if you will just use that image once why go to the bother. Within Word 2007 you can add the text on top of your photo using either WordArt or a text box. Which method to use depends on the effect desired. For text that is short and an interesting stylized look is what you want WordArt is a good option. For plain and simple text a text box can match the text to that in the rest of the document.

Text Box on Top of a Photo

Placing a text box on a photo can be as easy as inserting the photo, creating a text box and dragging the text box onto the photo.



To add a photo to a document place the insertion point in the document where the photo is to be located and click the Picture icon in the Illustrations group on the Insert tab. Browse to the photo in the Insert Picture dialog box, select it and click the Insert button.

To place a text box on the photo first create the text box. Place the insertion point on a line below the photo.

Then in the Text group on the Insert tab, click text box and then click to select Simple Text Box. In the inserted Text Box type the text. To change the font or style of the text, highlight the text and then select the desired text formatting as with any other text. Drag the text box sizing handles to resize it as necessary. Finally click the outside edge of the text box and drag it to the proper location on top of the photo.



The default Text Box will have white fill and a black border. For use over a photo you will probably want no fill color or border. With the Text Box still selected click Text Box Tools and on the Format tab, in the Text Box Styles group, click Shape Fill and select No Fill. Then click Shape Outline and select No Outline.

With the Text Box you can add text on top of a photo and move the text to position it over the photo, but you can't rotate it. To be able to rotate the text or use text that is more stylized use WordArt.

WordArt on Top of a Photo

To place WordArt on the photo first create a Drawing Canvas. Place the insertion point in the document and then in the Illustrations group on the Insert tab open the Shapes drop down menu and click New Drawing Canvas.




With the new drawing canvas still selected on the Insert tab, in the Illustrations group, click Picture. In the dialog

box browse to and select the photo to use and click the Insert button. Again on the Insert tab, but in the Text group, click WordArt, select the style desired, and type the text. Select either piece of art and use the sizing handles to resize as desired. Click the outside edge of the WordArt to select it and drag it over the photo. Use the rotation handle to rotate the text to the angle that works best for the photo.

Once the graphics are correctly formatted and positioned group them. That creates a single graphic that can be moved or resized. The text stays with the photo. To create a group click the outside edge of the photo, press and hold the CTRL key, and click the edge of the WordArt so both items are selected. Under Drawing Tools, on the Format tab, in the Arrange group, click the arrow next to Group, and then click Group.




Dwight "J.J." Johnson

WindowsTIPS

Startup Defender 2.8– Startup Manager and Startup Firewall. Startup Defender is a small Windows startup manager program sold by Zards software for \$19.95 that sits in your Windows tray and constantly monitors in real time the startup locations on your PC to help prevent programs from auto starting up behind your back. If a program tries to write itself into any startup location Startup Defender will pop up a window and ask if the program is allowed to place itself to start automatically with Windows. I got this software for free from Giveaway of the day a couple of months ago. There is also a similar one

on CNET at http://download.cnet.com/Startup-Defender/3000-2094 4-10822194.html ,

Another program that I like is Clear Cloud from Sunbelt Software. http://www.clearclouddns.com/ This one was suggested by Steve Bass who writes for one of the major computer magazines. Clear Cloud is a free service that checks every website address your computer is trying to access, whether you're browsing the internet, clicking a link in an email, or a program "under the hood" trying to communicate with servers for information or updates. If you think it has stopped you from accessing a good site, you click on a link, add your email and are told by by the author why the site is being blocked. If you can explain why it shouldn't be blocked, he will unblock it.





STAY IN THE NOW: Consistently

update your virus protection and antihacker software. There are new viruses and technologies created all the time that can weaken your protection and make you vulnerable to criminals.

DISARM AUTOMATIC LOGIN: Try to avoid using the Automatic Login feature that saves your name and password. Although it makes it easier for you to enter a site, it also makes it easier for hackers and criminals to obtain your personal information.

WIPE IT CLEAN: If you're disposing of your computer, make sure that you completely delete any personal information and also use a utility program that wipes (overwrites) the entire hard drive clean.





WORDTIPS

Copying Values

There are many ways that you can use Excel's tools to fill out various cells in a worksheet. One of the most common tools is to copy a cell (or cells) and then paste them into other cells. The only problem with this approach is that when you copy cells, you also copy the format of the original cells into the target cells. What if you just want to copy the values from the original cells, but retain the formatting already applied in the target cells?

You probably already know that you can use the Paste Special option from the Home tab of the ribbon (Excel 2007 and 2010) or the Edit menu (older versions of Excel), and then choose the Values option to paste just the values. If the target cells are right next to the original cells, there is an even easier way to accomplish the same task. Simply follow these steps:


- 1. Select the original cells whose values you want to copy.
- Right-click on the fill handle (at the bottom right-corner of the selection) and drag the selection to encompass the target cells. When you release the mouse button, a Context menu appears.
- Choose the Fill Values option. Excel fills the target cells with the values from the original cells; the formatting remains unchanged.

Inserting the User's Address

Word automatically maintains several items of information about you, as a user. One such item is your address, which is changed on the User Information tab of the Options dialog box. If you want to automatically insert the user address in your documents, you can follow these steps:

- Position the insertion point where you want the address inserted.
- 2. Make sure the Insert tab of the ribbon is selected.
- 3. In the Text group, click Quick Parts. You'll see a drop-down menu.
- 4. Choose Field. Word displays the Field dialog box.

5. In the Categories drop-down list, choose User Information.

- 6. In the Field Names list choose UserAddress.
- 7. Click on OK to close the dialog box and insert your field.


Understanding System Restore

Windows 7 has a new and improved version of System Restore that is far superior to the lame utility that came with XP. Setting a restore point was often painfully slow, and it rarely worked as it should have. Windows 7 System Restore easily helps you bring back your computer's system files to an earlier point in time. It's a way to undo system changes to your computer without affecting your personal files, such as e-mail, documents, or photos.



Sometimes, the installation of a program or a driver can cause an unexpected change to your computer or cause Windows to behave unpredictably. Usually, uninstalling the program or driver corrects the problem. If uninstalling does not fix the problem, you can try restoring your computer's system to an earlier date when everything worked correctly.

System Restore uses a feature called System Protection to regularly create and save restore points on your computer. These restore points contain information about registry settings and other system information that Windows uses. You can also create restore points manually.

System Restore is not intended for backing up personal files, so it cannot help you recover a photograph or video that has been deleted or damaged. You should regularly back up your personal files and important data using a backup program. Windows 7 has an excellent built-in backup utility.

Windows 7 uses the Shadow Copy feature, introduced in Vista. It's vastly superior to the process in XP and earlier versions of Windows. The old way used a simple file filter and copied files around the system which was clumsy compared to the Shadow Copy method. Today, Windows creates a snapshot of your drive which can later be used to restore your system should catastrophe occur.

Additional capabilities of Shadow copy include taking snapshots of files even when currently in use. Microsoft has incorporated this feature into Previous Versions which allows restoring a previous version of an application. Unfortunately, this power is available only in Windows Professional or Ultimate.

The easiest way to bring up System Restore is to type System in the Start menu search box and select it from the resulting list. Another way is to select the Recovery option from Control Panel, or you can simply type **rstrui** in the search box.

Whatever method you choose will bring up the System Restore dialog box that gives you some helpful information. Select the Next button to get a list of restore points. Most of the time you will be using the most recent restore point to get your system working again.

Focus your attention on the Description list. This can give you an important indication of what went wrong. Did your problem begin after installing a Critical Update, a backup operation, or a new

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freeware program that you couldn't resist?

When you apply System Restore the system creates another restore point so you can undo the change if your problem isn't fixed. You can't undo System Restore however, if you use it in safe mode. But you can run System Restore again and select a different restore point.

Restore points are saved until the disk space Windows allocates to the utility is used up. Then the oldest restore points are deleted as new ones are needed. The easiest way to delete all previous restore points is to turn System Restore off, and then turn it back on again. Don't worry about running out of space.

Many computer problems can be traced to sloppy programs written by people who don't know enough about proper programming techniques to get their utilities published by reliable vendors. It's surprising how many problems are generated by faulty uninstall tools. There are many sound freeware offerings out in cyberspace, but don't use them unless they come tested and approved by a trusted source like Smart Computing. :


