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Phil's Ramblings



Let me start by thanking DeBorah Sirilla for all her hard work in planning and coordinating our July picnic! And, many thanks to Bill Fosdick, our chef, and everyone else who helped with the picnic! Unfortunately, while we did not have rain, the weather was

certainly hot and humid. But, with two fans, cool drinks courtesy of J.J. and Judy and plenty of ice and water, all who attended enjoyed the food and companionship.

Our fall program schedule will kick off at the August meeting with a follow-up session about smartphones. In the past year, we shared information about the types of phones and plans that we have and what we liked (or disliked) about both. This new session will focus on how we use our phones. What do we do besides make and receive calls, or send and receive text messages? What apps have we installed, and how do we like them? What recommendations can we offer to each other about smartphone security? And, so on. Depending on interest, the amount of discussion and the time available, we'll see if it would be worthwhile to schedule more smartphone discussion at a meeting late this year or early in 2017.

For those of us who depend upon Windows-based computers and/or tablets, the big news is the release of the Windows 10 Anniversary Update on August 2nd. Microsoft will be rolling this update out to the 350 Million computers currently running Windows 10 on a gradual basis, with a priority being given to newer machines. Not surprisingly, there are quite a few changes to Windows 10 contained in this major update (which in earlier days would probably have been referred to as a Service Pack). It will be interesting to see how the update process works across those 350 Million Windows 10 devices. (I've already run into a "show-stopper" when trying to manually update two of my devices).

As some of you may remember I own a small blue HP netbook with an 11.6" display, known as an HP Stream computer. I also own a Dell Venue 8 tablet. Both devices contain 32 GB of solid-state storage, which is not expandable. Both came with Windows 8, and upgraded seamlessly to Windows 10. However, when the Microsoft installer software checked these devices for update suitability prior to installing the Anniversary Update, I was informed that I had to clear more storage capacity before the update could proceed. turns out that the user must have at least 20GB of available file storage for this update. However, the current version of Windows 10 takes up approximately 14 GB of the SSD capacity. Even with everything other than Windows 10 deleted from my on-board storage I have not been able to satisfy the "20 GB free" requirement on either device. As a result, I have not been able to install the update. I am not alone in owning these modest Windows computers, so I am waiting to see what MS comes up with for folks like us.

Elsewhere, perhaps you have seen mention recently about "hacks" of newer automobiles; up to and including the electronic theft of cars. There are a lot of ways this can happen. In some cases, thieves were able to install a device in the legally-required OBD II port under the dashboard on the driver's side (normally used as a diagnostic tool by mechanics to read trouble codes from the on-board computers). But in other cases, Wi-Fi signals generated in and around the car as all the electronics "talk" to each other can be intercepted and/or modified. Cars with so-called "keyless" ignition systems offer other vulnerabilities.

This is a sub-set of more generalized hacking attempts directed at all sorts of devices that are dependent on wireless transmission of data. There have been hacking attempts directed at our military drones; wireless security systems are an obvious target; disgruntled employees have exacted revenge against their employers by disrupting information and production processes, and so on. For more information about this topic, just search the internet for "Hacking into automobile computers". You'll find a lot of "hits"! And, some of the responses will in turn lead you into the other types of IoT hacking that I mention above.

However, while this example is benign, it doesn't take too much imagination to see how these techniques could be used to deliberately injure or kill someone by seizing control of his car!

I'm sure we will see more and more on this subject, as "good guys" and "bad guys" continue to expand their computer cat and mouse game in sync with new applications and hardware!


