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Cortana, Open Alexa, Amazon Says And Microsoft Agrees

In an unusual partnership, Amazon and Microsoft are working together to extend the ability of their overcontrolled digital assistants.

I talk to Cortana every day — at home, work and on-the-go — to get information about my day, to set reminders so I don't forget things, and to answer my questions. But I don't just use one digital assistant. I also frequently talk to Alexa to listen to audio books or to add things to my shopping list. Because people use and interact with all kinds of products, we're very excited to announce a first-ofits-kind collaboration with Amazon between Cortana and Alexa that will offer more choice, value and access to both intelligent personal assistants. Available later this year, this collaboration will allow you to access Alexa via Cortana on Windows 10 PCs, followed by Android and iOS in the future. Conversely, you'll be able to access Cortana on Alexa-enabled devices like the Amazon Echo,



Echo Dot and Echo Show.

Amazon press release, the collaboration between Microsoft and Amazon reflects our belief that when people and technology work together, everybody wins:

"Ensuring Cortana is available for our customers everywhere and across any device is a key priority for us. Bringing Cortana's knowledge, Office 365 integration, commitments and reminders to Alexa is a great step toward that goal."

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Phily Ramblings

ctober was a busy month! While people across America have been busy trying to protect themselves from the potential consequences of the Equifax data breach, new / improved scams and/or cyber-dangers have continued to appear. Here is an example.....

"IRS" robocalls. These, of course, are not really from the IRS although your caller ID will say they are. Folks who have been paying attention to the increase in "spoofed" caller IDs would typically ignore these calls, especially since the IRS normally contacts taxpayers by letter. (For example, if they do want to talk to you they will send you a letter explaining the situation and ask that you call them.) However, there is now a new wrinkle.

Starting this year, the IRS began using private collection agencies to assist in their collection efforts. Those agencies are authorized to call delinquent taxpayers as part of their normal process. But you should not begin receiving these legitimate phone calls without first having been contacted by mail by the IRS, on at least several occasions.

So, you would be well advised to ignore a call purporting to be from the IRS. Simply let the call go to voicemail. One of two things will happen. Either the caller will not leave a message, in which case you can simply go about your business, or he will leave a message, more likely than not demanding that you

call him back immediately to discuss your delinquent taxes

If the caller does leave a message and request for call back, check the caller ID information and the phone number that was provided for callback. Here are the four private collection agencies that the IRS is working with:

If the caller ID information and callback phone number do not match any of these agencies, you are dealing with a scammer. Just don't call back; it saves you from having to go through an annoying phone conversation.

(If by chance you do pick up the phone and find yourself in a scary conversation with someone claiming to be calling on behalf of the IRS, remember that legitimate callers will not demand payment via prepaid debit, iTunes or gift cards. Any payments should be made directly to the IRS, either electronically or by mail. If you have any qualms about the conversation, just hang up

the phone and follow up directly with the IRS to find out if there is a legitimate problem, and how it can be resolved.)

Speaking of taxes and the IRS, there is a growing scam that targets businesses. (The bad news is that the consequences of this scam affect individuals!) In this scam, "spear-phishing" emails are sent to employees who work in HR, designed to look as though they were sent by high-level executives in the company. In these emails, the HR employees are ordered to send copies of current year W-2s for employees to their "boss" by return email, for a confidential research project.

The special email address provided in the email is of course bogus; If the low-level HR recipients are afraid to challenge the "boss" who supposedly requested the W-2's, they may be sent as ordered. Armed with names, Social Security numbers and actual pay / withholding information, the bad guys can now file bogus income tax returns in your name and have your refund sent to them.

I haven't seen a good countermeasure for this, since individual employees have no way of knowing that this is going on until they file their legitimate tax returns and have them rejected by the IRS. However, the IRS is aware of this problem and presumably is taking steps to identify and investigate questionable returns.

Moving to the larger problem of massive ongoing data breaches..... As discussed at our October meeting, these breaches typically put your logon credentials at risk – for emails, for financial accounts and so on. Bad guys can use them to do lots of bad things – clean out your bank account, enlist your email account in one of their botnets, and so on. This makes it very important for you to consider two-factor authentication (2FA)! As one cyber-security article put it, "2FA makes your passwords worthless to cyber thieves".

This can be a minor annoyance when you log-in from an unfamiliar computer for the first time, because you will be challenged to complete whatever 2FA process you have established for the account you are trying to access. But, the good news is that you can complete the process and logon. The bad guy cannot. Just remember to set up a unique password and 2FA process for each account.

If you haven't already done so, I encourage you to set up a digital folder (or file folder) devoted to cyber-security, and use it to collect related emails,

articles from news media / Internet, information you receive at our LCACE meetings and elsewhere. Cyber-security challenges will be with us forever, and the bad guys are smart and creative. We must be knowledgeable, disciplined and vigilant if we are to remain safe!

On a separate note, I have been asked to give my recent presentations on Cyber-Security and Digital Afterlife at the Waukegan Township Park Place Senior Center in November and December. For those who were not able to attend one or both of those LCACE presentations you are welcome to attend the coming presentations at the Senior Center. The Cyber-Security presentation will be at 1:00pm on Wednesday, November 29th; the Digital Afterlife presentation will be at 1:00 pm on Wednesday, December 13th. The Senior Center is located at 414 S. Lewis Avenue, Waukegan.







What is an iPad Widget?

And How Do I Install One?

Widgets are small apps that run on a device's interface, such as a clock or a widget that tells you the current weather. While widgets have been popular on Android and Windows RT tablets for a while now, they haven't made their way to the iPad... until now. The iOS 8 update brought "Extensibility" to the iPad. Extensibility is a cool feature that allows a snippet of an app to run within another app. This allows widgets to run on the iPad via the Notification Center. You'll be able to customize the notification center to show widgets and choose which widgets to show in the notification center. You can also choose to access the notification center while the iPad is locked, so you can see your widget without typing in your passcode.

How do I Install a Widget on My iPad?

Widgets can be installed into the Notification Center by opening notifications by sliding your finger down, careful to start at the very top of the screen, and then tapping the 'Edit' button located at the end of your active notifications. The edit screen is split into those widgets that will display in the Notification Center and those that are installed on the device but not currently showing with the other notifications. To install a widget, simply tap the green button with the plus sign next to it. To remove a widget, tap the red button with the minus sign and then tap the remove button that appears to the right of the widget. Yes, it's that simple. Once the widget is installed, it will be displayed when you open the Notification Center.

Will There Be a Separate 'Widget' Store?

The way Apple has implemented widgets is by allowing an app to display a custom interface within another app. This means a widget is just an app that allows part of itself to be shown in another app, which in this case is the notification center. Sound confusing? It's not. If you want to see sports scores in your notification center, you can simply download a sports app like ScoreCenter from the app store. The app will need to support becoming a widget in the notification center, but you don't need to install a special version of the app. Once installed, you can configure which apps to show in the notification center through the iPad's notification settings.

Can I Use a Widget to Replace the On-Screen Keyboard?

Another exciting benefit of Extensibility is the ability to use third-party keyboards. Swype has long been

a popular alternative to traditional typing (or tapping, as we do on our tablets). An Android keyboard alternative, Swype lets you draw words instead of tap them out, which ultimately leads to faster and more accurate typing. (It's also amazing how quickly you can get used to the idea). For information on installing third-party keyboards, we'll have to wait until third-party keyboards arrive in the App Store. Several have already been confirmed, including Swype.

What Other Ways Can I Use a Widget?

Because extensibility is the ability for an app to run within another app, widgets can expand almost any app. For example, you can use the Pinterest app as a widget by installing it into Safari as an additional way to share web pages. You can also use photo editing apps like *Litely* inside of the iPad's Photos app, which gives you a single place to edit a photo and use features from other photo-editing apps.

How to Reorder Widgets on the iPad Notification Center

Now that you have added a few widgets to the iPad's Notification Center, it might occur to you that widgets further down the page would be more useful towards the top. For example, the Yahoo Weather widget makes a great replacement for the default weather widget, but it won't do you as much good if it is at the bottom of the list. You can easily reorder widgets in the Notification Center by dragging a widget and dropping it in the order you want it to appear.

- First, you need to be in edit mode. You can enter edit mode by scrolling down to the bottom of the Notification Center and tapping the edit button.
- Next, tap the three horizontal lines next to the widget, and without removing your finger from the screen, drag it up or down the list.

This makes a great way of customizing the Notification Center and quickly getting at the information or widgets you want to see most. Unfortunately, Apple doesn't allow a widget to go above the Today Summary and Traffic Conditions or below the Tomorrow Summary.

THE BEST CAMERA, as they say, is the one you have with you.

Oh sure, your digital-SLR-toting friends might get their lanyards all tied in a knot about you hoist- ing your iPhone or Android device. But smartphone cameras have some advantages when it comes to editing and sharing your work. To help you get more out of your summer "phonegraphy" consider the following tips and tricks.

Turn the phone sideways. Unless you're taking a picture of the Empire State Building, use the horizontal ("landscape") orientation when taking a photo, as it will look much better on a computer or television later on (that is, no vertical black bars on each side of the photo). Besides, a landscape photo is better for group shots and scenery, as it gets more into the frame. Speaking of scenery, play around with your phone's panoramic mode for ultrawide photos.

Get up close and personal. Don't be shy. Unless it's a large, growling dog, there's no reason to be 5 feet away from your subject. Fill the whole frame with your subjects.

Going in closer also means you can capture more facial detail, such as light freckling, a charm- ing dimple or soft, pale blues of the iris. Don't use your phone's digital zoom, as it might make your photo look pixelated-get closer yourself. Play around with how close is too close, though, as that "macro" shot of a flower petal might look blurry when you look at it later on.

Use the light around you. Avoid using the flash wherever possible; instead, try to use the light that's accessible, whether it's overhead lighting while indoors or, preferably, the sun outside. Cloudy days are great for photos, as they diffuse

the sun.

If the sun is out, be sure your back-and not your subject's-is to the sun or the subject will look like a blacked-out silhouette. The hour before and after sunset creates gorgeous light for photos.

Be a human tripod. If you can help it, don't hold your phone at arm's length when taking photos. You'll probably shake the phone more than you think, which could result in blurry images. Instead, turn yourself into a human tripod by holding the camera with both hands and pulling your arms into your chest or stomach. You might look a little silly, but you'll see the difference with your sturdier grip.

Position for composition. Instead of placing your subjects in the center of the frame all the time, move them to the left or right to make your photos instantly more powerful and beautiful. Better yet, go in on an angle to add extra energy to the shot.

Also, try to match the height of the subject, such as by kneeling on the ground to snap a picture of a toddler, to ensure you're at eye level instead of angling up or down.

Have fun with filters. Phone cameras usually include filters as part of the software, but there are numerous apps that can help you easily edit and share photos and videos. Some automatically tweak your shots for better color and brightness. Apps like Instagram can add fun filters, such as a sepia finish or a retro '70s look. Snapchat adds fun animated effects to your pies. Literally thousands of apps are available, for all platforms, so experiment away.'

Back up, back up, back up. There's nothing worse than losing your smartphone and never having backed up all those photos on it. There are many ways to back them up. One is to plug your phone into your PC or Mac every night to charge it up, and check off the option to back up everything onto the hard drive.

Another option is to take advantage of a free password-protected "cloud" service-like OneDrive, Drop box, iCloud, Google Drive or Google Photos- and have it upload all of your phones photos when- ever you snap them. To save cellular data, you can select to upload only over Wi-Fi.

Finally, some USB thumb drives are wireless and let you back up photos and videos from a phone. It's worth safeguarding your memories.


Build a Better Password

Use these proven techniques to block hackers from accessing your accounts

Think of a computer as being a front door to your wealth and secrets. It can be make of flimsy wood or as impenetrable as a titanium bank vault. Here's how to best secure your fortress.



Use passphrases

Hacker use sophisticated software that can run millions of combinations of letters and symbols in a short time. Your defense: longer passwords, Former hacker Kevin Mitnick recommends 20 characters or longer. The trick: use a sentence of phrase you create, such as "My Aunt Sylvis has loved me since I was a child." It's ultra-hard to hack but easy to remember. For even more security, add a number or

symbol at the end, along with a capital letter or two.

Add a second door

Two-factor authentication services add an extra layer of security to your most vital digital accounts. You log in to an account using your usual password. Next, the two-factor authentication site sends your phone a six-digit code that you must enter before gaining access. For a list of websites that offer two-factor authentication, go to twofactorauth.org

Keep your password in a vault

Never store passwords in a file on your computer. Instead, use password manager apps that store passwords in a well-protected digital space. All you need is a master password to access the list. Popular versions that use the cloud technology include LastPass, Dashline and iPassword. Apps that put the vault on your hard drive include RoboForm. Password Safe or KeePass.

Refresh routinely

Once a year, change the password on all your important accounts. With hackers stealing data on millions of accounts at a time, this will keep you protected if their focus turns toward you. Also change your password if you've notified by a website that its security has been breached.

Vary your passwords

That's the golden rule, cybersecurity experts say; Why let one key unlock every one of your digital doors?

COMPROMISED WITH MALWARE –

CCleaner version 5.33 was compromised with malware. Please check to see which version of CCleaner you have on your computer.

Open CCleaner and you will find the version number in the upper left corner on the title bar.

Version 5.33 of the CCleaner app offered for download between August 15 and September 12 was modified to include the Floxif malware, according to a report published by Cisco Talos a few minutes ago. Updating to recent versions removes malware.

Floxif is a malware downloader that gathers information about infected systems and sends it back to its C&C server. The malware also had the ability to download and run other binaries, but at the time of writing, there is no evidence that Floxif downloaded additional second-stage payloads on infected hosts.

The malware collected information such as computer name, a list of installed software, a list of running processes, MAC addresses for the first three network interfaces, and unique IDs to identify each computer in part. Researchers noted that the malware only ran on 32-bit systems. The malware also quit execution if the user was not using an administrator account.

Avast recently bought Piriform – below from Avast CTO:

In an email to Bleeping Computer, Avast CTO Ondrej Vlcek said that updating CCleaner to the most recent recent versions fixes any issues, as "the only malware to remove is the one embedded in the CCleaner binary itself."

"The affected software (CCleaner v5.33.6162 and CCleaner Cloud v1.07.3191) has been installed on 2.27M machines from its inception up until now," VIcek also added. "We believe that these users are safe now as our investigation indicates we were able to disarm the threat before it was able to do any harm."

"There is no indication or evidence that any additional "malware" has been delivered through the backdoor," Vlcek added.


Before I leave the house, I place my evening meal in the Sosu Vide cooler and set the temp and timer on my phone and get a notification when it's done.



Answer: On this day in 1867, the U.S. formally took possession of Alaska after purchasing the territory from Russia for \$7.2 million, or less than two cents an acre. The

Alaska purchase comprised 586,412 square miles, about twice the size of Texas, and was championed by William Henry Seward, the enthusiasticly expansionist secretary of state under President Andrew Johnson. At the time, critics thought Seward was crazy and called the deal "Seward's folly." The Senate ratified the treaty that approved the purchase by just one vote.
